There are around 400 different types of sharks in the world. Sharks are the top predators of the ocean's natural food chain.



Sharks have incredibly sharp teeth and they never run out of them. If a shark loses a tooth, another moves forward from within the shark's jaw (where it neatly keeps a supply of replacement teeth). This way, it is almost impossible for a shark to end up without a full set of teeth. A shark may grow and use over 20 000 teeth in its lifetime.

Sharks have super senses. Two-thirds of a shark's brain is dedicated to its most powerful sense - smell. They have a mirror-like layer on their eyes, allowing them to see better in the water. Sharks are also able to feel vibrations in the water, using a line of canals that go from its head to its tail. These canals are filled with water and contain sensory cells with hairs growing out of them.

On average, a shark's lifespan is 20-30 years in the wild.

Recall Facts and Details

The iPad

On January 27, 2010 Steve Jobs revealed the first Apple iPad. The iPad was the first popular mobile tablet of its kind.

The first Apple iPad had a 9.7-inch screen, Wi-Fi and Bluetooth capabilities, but no camera. It came only in black with a choice of 16, 32 or 64 gigabytes of storage and a battery life of ten hours.

When the first Apple iPad was released, it cost \$499. This was half of what consumers were expecting to pay. The low price made tablet technology more accessible to more people worldwide.

Some critics labelled the first Apple iPad as 'unimaginative' and 'just a big phone', but with 300 000 sales in the first week, the iPad was seen as a great achievement for Apple.

Soon competitors tried to 'copy' the iPad by releasing their own versions of a tablet, most of which failed. However, Samsung was successful with their own Galaxy Tab.

By April 2011, over 15 million iPads had been sold. This showed that in just one year, Apple had done the impossible. They had made the world's first popular tablet computer.



Platypus

The platypus is a semi-aquatic mammal found in small rivers and streams in Queensland, New South Wales, ACT, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania.



It is duck-billed, has a beaver-like tail, has otter-like fur and webbed feet. Platypus are monotremes, which means they lay eggs instead of giving birth.

> Platypus are nocturnal, which means they come out at night or at twilight to feed. They close their eyes and ears when under water. When they feed on worms, insects and crayfish, they use their sense of electroreception and dig up the river beds with their bills.

The platypus is an excellent swimmer. It can stay under water for around 30 seconds before coming up for air. The average length of a male platypus is 50cm and the average length of a female is 43cm. They can weigh between 1 and 2.4kg. Their predators include snakes, water rats, hawks, owls, eagles and sometimes crocodiles.

Did you know...? The platypus has been used as a mascot for national events in Australia and is featured on the Australian 20 cent coin.

Improvisation, in drama, is **the playing of dramatic scenes without written dialogue**, it is made up in the spur of the moment.


